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#### Exercise 1 – Zero-Shot Prompting (Easy)

Task:

Write a zero-shot prompt asking AI to explain “Blockchain” in simple words.

Rules:

- Do not give any example.
  - Keep it as a direct instruction.
  - Mention audience and clarity if needed.
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## Exercise 2 – Improve a Zero-Shot Prompt (Easy–Medium)

Poor Prompt:

Explain climate change.

Task:

Rewrite this as a stronger zero-shot prompt by:

- Adding audience
- Adding clarity
- Defining length

(Remember: No example should be included.)

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## Exercise 3 – One-Shot Prompting (Medium)

Task:

Create a one-shot prompt to teach AI how to explain concepts in one simple sentence.

Topic to ask after example: “Explain Gravity.”

Rules:

- First provide one example question and answer.
  - Then ask the new question.
  - Keep the style simple.
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## Exercise 4 – Few-Shot Prompting (Medium)

Task:

Create a few-shot prompt to train AI to define scientific terms in one simple sentence.

Final term to ask: “Define Photosynthesis.”

Rules:

- Provide at least two example question-answer pairs.
  - Then ask the final question.
  - Maintain consistent format.
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## Exercise 5 – Scenario-Based (Medium)

Scenario:

You are preparing structured answers for a school quiz competition.  
You want all answers in one short, clear sentence.

Task:

Write a few-shot prompt that teaches AI the expected format and then asks:  
“What is Democracy?”
